c. Describe the purpose of this DoD information system or electronic collection and describe the types of personal information about individuals collected in the system.

Abbott EP (electrophysiology) Cardiac Mapping System V1.x_AI consists of the EP Workmate and the next generation Claris Workmate. The Workmate is a fully computerized system for capturing and measuring physiological data in the clinical EP laboratory. It provides digital signal acquisition and display of those electrical signals on high resolution monitors. The WorkMate Recording System is indicated for use during clinical electrophysiology procedures. An Electrophysiology system is used to monitor and analyze surface ECGs and intracardiac signals. Catheters are guided into the heart and intracardiac electrical signals are acquired from the electrodes on the indwelling catheters from various heart locations. The system is also intended for recording electrocardiograms from multiple sites during clinical assessment of electrophysiological interventions. The EP and Claris WorkMate Recording System provides on-line measurements of intrachannel intervals, and presents these measurements on the display monitor.

Abbott EP Cardiac Mapping System V1.x_AI Personally Identifiable Information (PII) collected are personnel identifiers and medical information to include Protected Health Information (PHI), names, and date of birth. The categories of individuals in which PII is collected includes Department of Defense (DoD) Health Care Beneficiaries such as Military Members of the Armed Forces, Military Retirees, and their family members; DoD Civilian Employees; Foreign Nationals; Members of the United States Coast Guard; and other categories of individuals who receive medical treatment at DoD Treatment Facilities/Activities. PII is collected from both members of the general public and Federal employees and/or Federal contractors.

Local sites are responsible for day-to-day operations, maintenance, and management of EP Cardiac Mapping. Sites are responsible for ensuring the device is configured to meet CyberLOG and RMED approved configurations. EP Cardiac Mapping is owned by DHA's CyberLOG and operated by various MTFs as needed.

PII is collected to match an individual with his/her medical diagnostic cardiac studies and to ensure accuracy of these studies are integrated in the medical records for that individual.
