Mr. Arnold Fisher, Remembering a Champion of Military Health

Mr. Arnold Fisher, notable champion of military service members with traumatic brain injury (TBI) and other invisible wounds of war, passed away on September 11.

As honorary chairman of the Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund (IFHF), Fisher spearheaded IFHF's contributions to funding and

building the National Intrepid Center of Excellence (NICoE) and the Intrepid Spirit Centers (ISCs) across the Military Health System and gifted them to the Department of Defense.

Fisher's dedication to his country resulted in more than 90 percent of Defense Intrepid Network patients remaining on active duty after being discharged from our Intensive Outpatient Program, fulfilling the goal to support warfighter readiness, and enabling our nation's heroes to lead full and productive lives with TBI.

In addition to funding the NICoE and ISCs, Fisher also spearheaded the building of the Center for the Intrepid in San Antonio, Texas to treat service members suffering amputations, limb trauma, and severe burns. Fisher has also served as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Intrepid Museum Foundation and chairman of the Fisher House Foundation.
